



Located only two miles from the Ash Meadows national refuge and seven miles from the California entrance to Death Valley, The Chapel at Longstreet is a nondenominational event space available for weddings, baptisms, memorials, and church services.

Walk into our Amargosa Valley chapel and take a trip back in time. The stained-glass windows and wooden pews are straight from the 1800s and the view of the mountain ranges will take your breath away. Our chapel near death valley is a replica of a Catholic church built in 1864 in the mining town of Belmont, Nevada. Jim Marsh, owner of Longstreet Inn, designed and built this quaint chapel to honor the historic era of mining in Nevada.

Reception facilities are available within the hotel. Chapel reservations are made by calling the Longstreet Inn & Casino at (775) 372-1777. We provide the nondenominational officiant, and you don't have to worry about a waiting period. In Nevada, you can receive a marriage license the same day you apply for it. Oasis in the Desert: Discovering the Wonders of Ash Meadows National Wildlife Refuge

In the heart of Nevada's Amargosa Valley, a landscape often perceived as barren and desolate, lies a surprising oasis teeming with life. Ash Meadows National Wildlife Refuge is a testament to nature's resilience and a sanctuary for some of the most unique and endangered species on Earth. More than just a refuge, it's a vibrant reminder that even in the most arid environments, life can find a way.

Tucked away about 90 miles northwest of Las Vegas, Ash Meadows is a world away from the glitz and glamour of the city. Here, the shimmering lights of the casinos are replaced by the twinkling of stars in an impossibly dark sky, and the cacophony of the Strip fades into the gentle croaking of frogs and the whisper of wind through the reeds.

#### A Spring-Fed Paradise

The secret to Ash Meadows' survival lies in its remarkable network of over 30 seeps and springs. These water sources, fed by an ancient underground aquifer, surface throughout the refuge, creating vital habitats that support a remarkable concentration of endemic life. This means that many of the creatures found in Ash Meadows exist nowhere else on the planet.

Imagine tiny pupfish, smaller than your thumb, evolving in isolated springs for thousands of years, adapting to the specific conditions of their unique environment. These are not just any fish; they are living relics, survivors of a bygone era, and indicators of the health of the entire ecosystem. Ash Meadows is home to four pupfish species: the Devil's Hole pupfish (perhaps the most endangered fish in the world), the Amargosa pupfish, the Warm Springs pupfish, and the Ash Meadows speckled dace.

#### More Than Just Fish

The biodiversity doesn't stop with the pupfish. Ash Meadows also provides a sanctuary for several other endangered species, including the Amargosa toad, the Ash Meadows naucorid (a tiny aquatic insect), and a variety of endemic plants. Walking through the refuge, you might spot the delicate blooms of the Ash Meadows milkvetch or the vibrant yellow flowers of the Ash Meadows blazing star.

#### **Exploring the Refuge**

Ash Meadows offers a variety of ways to experience its unique beauty and learn about its importance. Several trails weave through the different habitats, providing opportunities for birdwatching, wildlife viewing, and photography.



Crystal Reservoir: This area offers a glimpse into the larger springs and allows visitors to observe a variety of birdlife.

Point of Rocks Boardwalk Trail: This easily accessible trail showcases the unique flora and fauna of the spring-fed wetlands.

Devil's Hole: While access to the actual hole is restricted to protect the pupfish, a viewing platform allows visitors to observe this unique geothermal feature and learn about the perilous existence of its inhabitant.

The Refuge visitor center provides valuable information about the history, geology, and ecology of Ash Meadows, as well as tips for responsible visitation.

#### TOM KELLY'S BOTTLE HOUSE -RHYOLITE, NEVADA

The Tom Kelly Bottle House, constructed in 1906 by Tom Kelly, an ex-stonemason turned gold miner from Australia, stands as a rare exemplar of bottle house design in the United States. In the state of Nevada, where timber is both scarce and costly, resourceful miners utilized inexpensive and easily obtained materials when erecting their dwellings. A popular choice proved to be glass bottles, which were employed akin to bricks and secured in place with adobe mortar. With their ability to keep interiors pleasantly cool during scorching summers, retain warmth throughout winters, and permit ample natural light, bottle houses garnered immense popularity in hot climates.

For this particular bottle house, Kelly sourced over 50,000 bottles, generously paying local children a modest sum of 10 cents for each wheelbarrow loaded with bottles (equating to approximately \$3 in 2021). The overall construction expenses amounted to roughly \$2,500, a majority of which was allocated towards acquiring wooden embellishments and fixtures. Surprisingly, rather than residing in the meticulously crafted dwelling, Kelly opted to auction it off. His decision resulted in the sale of 400 tickets at \$5 each,

leading to a net loss of approximately \$500. The coveted prize of the raffle was bestowed upon the Bennett family, who resided in the bottle house from 1906 to 1914. Seeking to enhance the structure, the Bennetts enlisted the services of Dave Kinney, a skilled shipwright, to construct the porch roof and incorporate decorative elements such as a false chimney and intricate gingerbread trim.

Due to its distinctive location and appearance, the bottle house gained significant recognition as a highly desirable filming destination. In 1924, Paramount Pictures selected it as a captivating backdrop for their motion picture "Wanderers in the Wasteland," based on the renowned Zane Grey novel. Notably, that same year, the house also featured in the production of "The Air Mail." During filming, a portion of the rear wall was temporarily dismantled to accommodate interior shots. Following the conclusion of filming, the production company promptly restored and reconstructed the wall, coupled with performing essential stabilization and preservation work on the exterior. Location of this house is on Rhyolite Road, 1.4 miles North of Nevada Route 374, on the right when traveling North.
