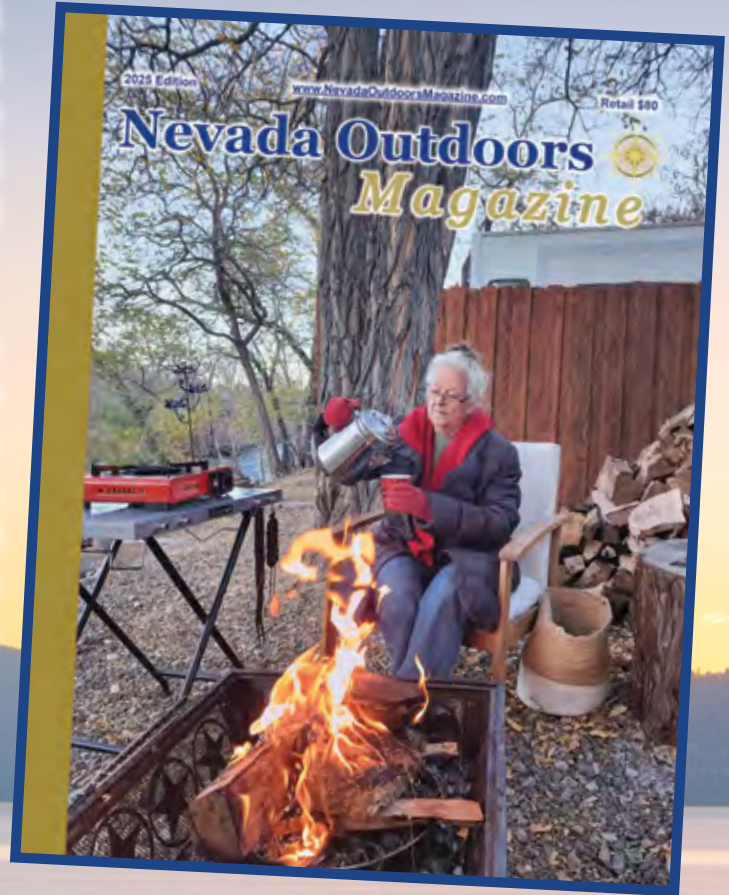

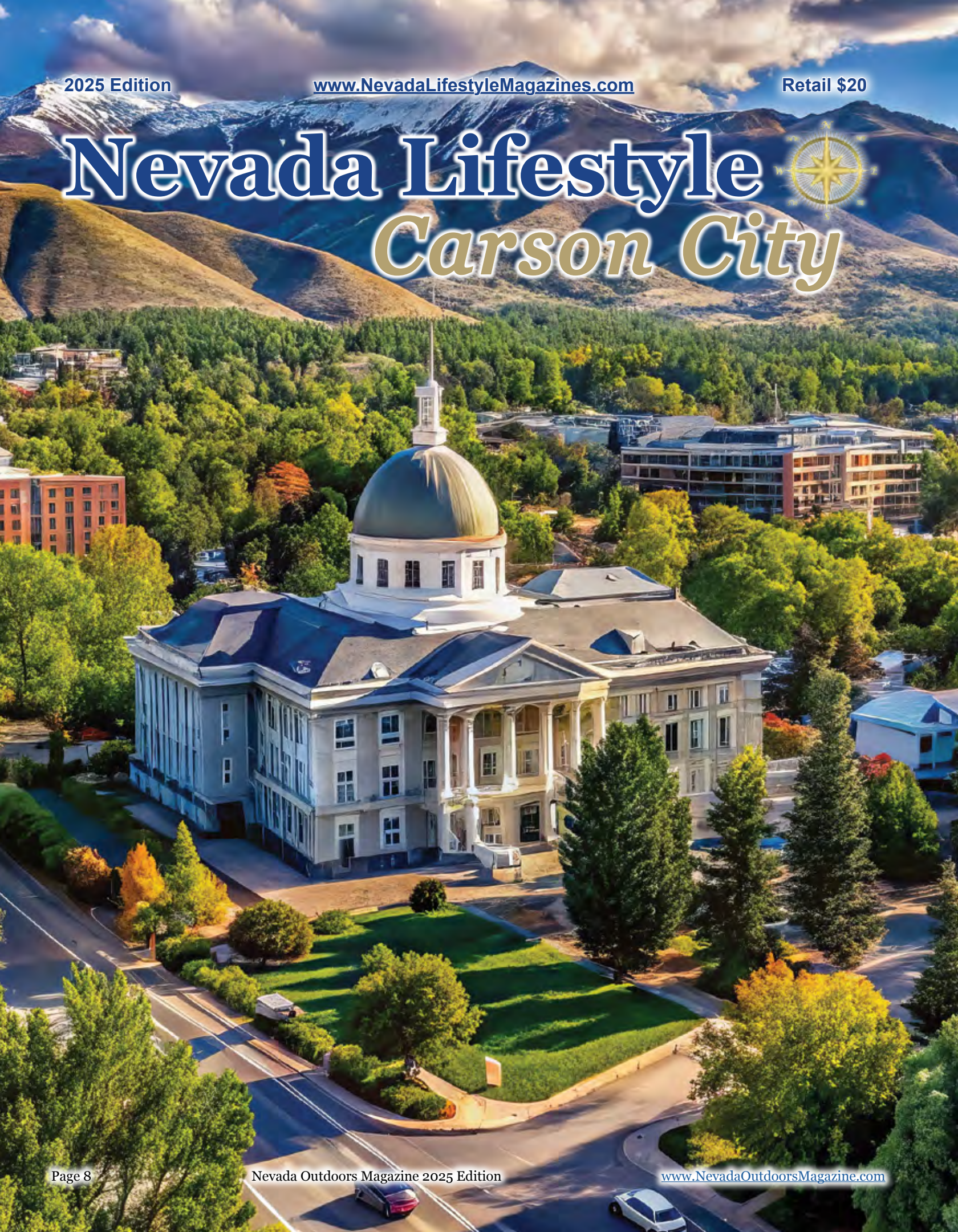

## NEVADA STATE RAILROAD MUSEUM - CARSON CITY, NEVADA

Situated in Carson City, Nevada, the Nevada State Railroad Museum holds a significant role in preserving the rich railroad heritage of the state. It boasts an impressive collection of locomotives and cars from the renowned Virginia and Truckee Railroad. The museum's vast array of equipment was acquired from various Hollywood studios, where they had been utilized in numerous film and television productions. Under the management of the Nevada Department of Tourism and Cultural Affairs, the museum officially opened its doors in 1980 as the Virginia & Truckee Railroad Museum, commonly referred to as the V&T Railroad Museum. However, in 1985, it underwent a name change and was rebranded as the Nevada State Railroad Museum.

Within its collection, one can find a diverse range of historically significant passenger and freight equipment that pays homage to the local community. The museum offers a multitude of activities, including the operation of both standard gauge (4 ft 8+1/2 in) and narrow gauge (3 ft) railroad equipment. Visitors can indulge in captivating train rides, exhilarating handcar rides, engaging lectures, an annual railroad history symposium, ever-changing exhibits,

and a plethora of special events. Additionally, an ongoing research and restoration program remains a key aspect of the museum's endeavors.

Currently, the museum showcases a captivating exhibit commemorating the 150th anniversary of the completion of the First transcontinental railroad. This notable display prominently features V&T Coach No. 17. Originally constructed for the Central Pacific Railroad, this remarkable coach transported Leland Stanford to the momentous Golden Spike ceremony at Promontory Summit, Utah. Furthermore, the museum grounds now house the historic Wabuska Depot, which was painstakingly relocated from its original location in Wabuska, Nevada. As a functioning railroad station, the depot continues to serve as the primary ticketing center for the museum's train rides, adding an authentic touch to the visitor experience.

# Sharpening the Claws: Inside the Navy's Topgun School in Fallon, Nevada

It's here, at Naval Air Station Fallon, that the United States Navy's Strike Fighter Tactics Instructor program, more commonly known as Topgun, molds already skilled fighter pilots into the nation's elite aerial gladiators.

Immortalized in popular culture, the real-life Topgun is far more than just adrenaline-fueled dogfights. It's a rigorous and intensely demanding course designed to produce instructors capable of developing and refining fighter tactics, techniques, and procedures for the entire Navy and Marine Corps.

## Beyond the Need for Speed: The Anatomy of Topgun Training

The SFTI program isn't a weekend warrior retreat. It's a nine-week crucible of academic study, flight operations, and debriefing sessions that push pilots to their absolute limits. Candidates, already seasoned veterans with considerable fleet experience, are carefully selected for their exceptional flying skills, tactical acumen, and leadership potential.

The curriculum is multifaceted and covers a vast range of topics, including:

**Advanced Air Combat Maneuvering (ACM):** This is where the famous dogfights come into play. Pilots learn to maximize their aircraft's performance, anticipate their opponent's moves, and exploit weaknesses in their tactics.

**Air-to-Ground Tactics:** Mastering the precision delivery of ordnance against land-based targets is crucial. This involves understanding weapon systems, target identification, and developing effective attack strategies.

**Electronic Warfare (EW):** In the modern battlespace, electronic warfare is paramount. Topgun pilots learn to identify, counter, and utilize electronic countermeasures to gain an advantage.

**Threat Analysis:** A deep understanding of enemy aircraft capabilities and tactics is essential for survival and success. Pilots study the strengths and weaknesses of potential adversaries, allowing them to develop effective countermeasures.

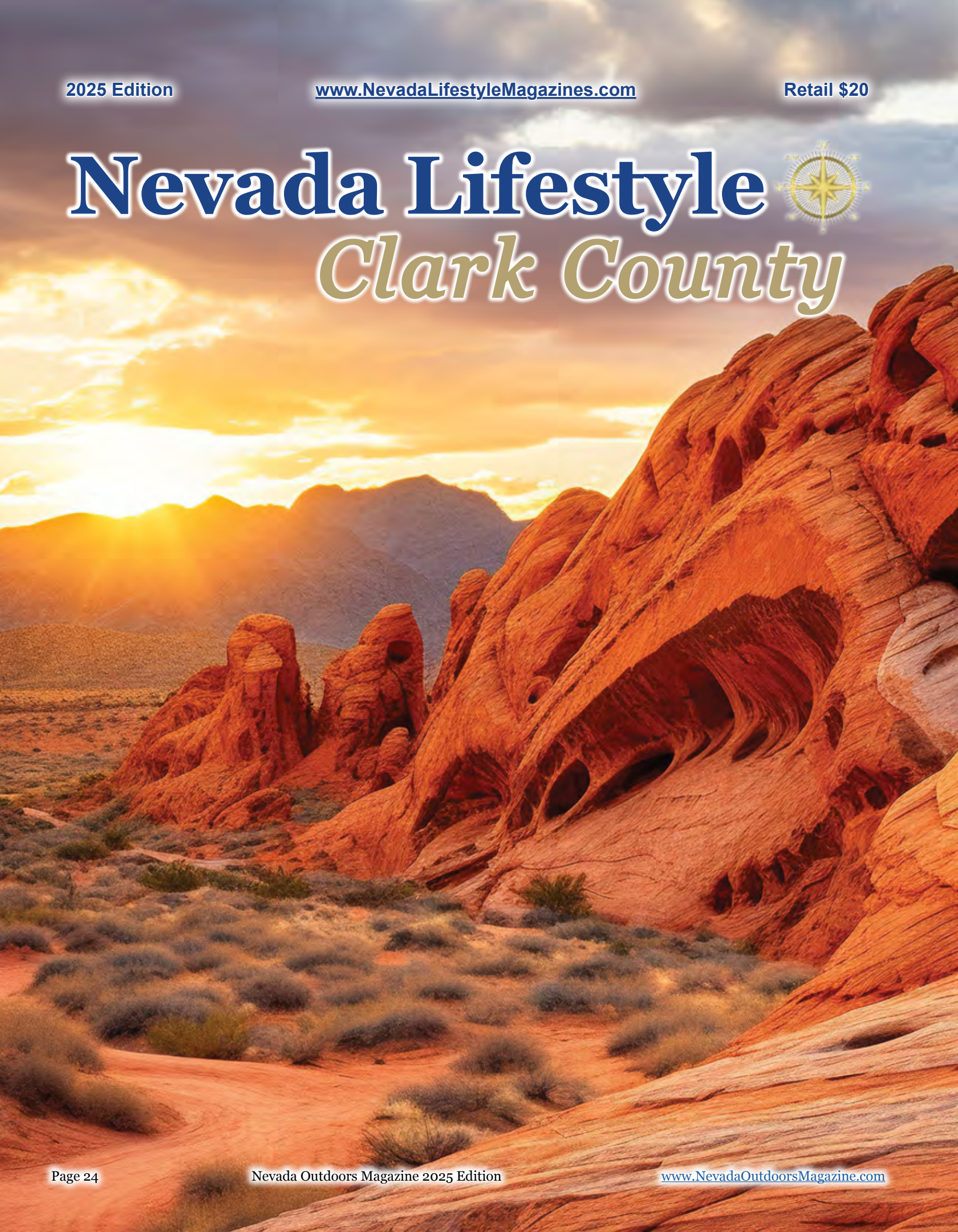

## THE MOB MUSEUM - LAS VEGAS, NEVADA

The National Museum of Organized Crime and Law Enforcement, officially known as The Mob Museum, is situated in Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada, United States, and serves as a history museum.

Its grand opening took place on February 14, 2012. The primary focus of The Mob Museum is to showcase the artifacts, stories, and chronicles pertaining to organized crime in the United States, along with the efforts by law enforcement agencies to combat such unlawful activities. The museum is located in the well-preserved historic Las Vegas Post Office and Courthouse, which was constructed in 1933 and listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Positioned on Stewart Avenue, a couple of blocks to the north of Fremont Street, the bustling hub of the downtown casino district, The Mob Museum was developed under the guidance of Dennis Barrie, renowned for his involvement in the creation of the International Spy Museum and the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. The governance of the museum is entrusted to the “300 Stewart Avenue Corporation,” a non-profit board, in collaboration with the City of Las Vegas.

Its core mission revolves around exploring the complex relationship between organized crime and law enforcement, both in Las Vegas and the wider United States. In the year 2000, the city acquired the former post office and federal courthouse from the federal government for a mere \$1, with the condition that it would be restored architecturally and repurposed for cultural endeavors. The concept of establishing a museum dedicated to the mob was conceived in 2002 by then-Mayor Oscar Goodman, who himself had a background as a defense attorney for organized crime figures.

Initially met with resistance from Italian-American groups, the project garnered support from the FBI, including Ellen Knowlton, the former head agent in Las Vegas, who assumed the presidency of the museum’s board. The estimated project budget amounted to \$50 million, out of which \$26 million was allocated for the historic building’s restoration.

# The Hoover Dam: A Monument to American Ingenuity and Perseverance



The Hoover Dam, a colossal concrete arch-gravity dam straddling the Colorado River on the border between Nevada and Arizona, stands as a potent symbol of American ingenuity, ambition, and ultimately, perseverance in the face of adversity. Its construction during the height of the Great Depression not only provided much-needed jobs but also tamed a wild river, delivering vital water and power to the arid landscapes of the Southwest.

The story of the Hoover Dam begins long before its physical construction. For decades, the untamed Colorado River was known for its unpredictable floods and droughts, posing constant threats to agricultural communities downstream. The idea of harnessing its power and controlling its flow gained traction in the early 20th century, culminating in the Boulder Canyon Project Act of 1928, authorizing the construction of the dam.

Selecting the site was a challenge. After careful consideration, Black Canyon, a deep gorge carved by the Colorado River, was chosen for its narrow width

and solid rock foundation, ideal for supporting the immense weight of the structure. The project was awarded to a consortium known as Six Companies, Inc., a coalition of experienced construction firms led by Frank Crowe, a pioneer in concrete dam building.

Construction began in 1931 and was a feat of engineering unlike anything seen before. The first task was to divert the mighty Colorado River. This was achieved by drilling four 50-foot diameter tunnels through the canyon walls, diverting the river around the construction site. These tunnels, now tourist attractions themselves, provide a glimpse into the scale of the project and the challenges faced by the workers.

The dam itself was built using a revolutionary method. Rather than pouring the concrete in one massive block, it was poured in interlocking columns, allowing the concrete to cool and shrink evenly, preventing cracking and ensuring its structural integrity. Millions of cubic yards of concrete were used, enough to pave a two-lane highway from Seattle to New York City.





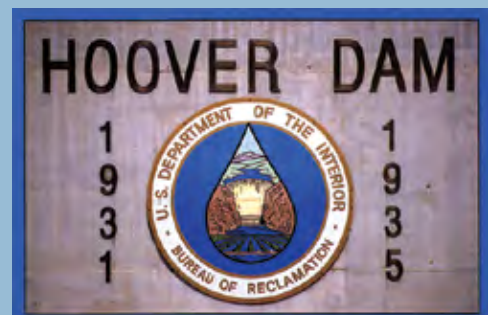
Life for the thousands of workers involved in the project was arduous and dangerous. The extreme heat of the Nevadan desert, coupled with the precarious working conditions, took a heavy toll. Despite the official death toll of 96 (a figure disputed by some who believe it was significantly higher), the dedication and resilience of these men and women are undeniable. They built homes, schools, and a sense of community in the harsh desert landscape, transforming the barren area into a bustling hub of activity.

Completed in 1936, two years ahead of schedule, the Hoover Dam was an immediate success. It tamed the Colorado River, creating Lake Mead, the largest reservoir in the United States at the time. The dam provided flood control, irrigation water for agriculture, and generated hydroelectric power for homes and industries across the Southwest.

The Hoover Dam continues to serve its vital purpose today, providing essential resources to millions. More than just a source of water and power, it stands as

a testament to the power of human ingenuity and collaborative effort. A marvel of engineering, a symbol of overcoming adversity, and a window into a pivotal moment in American history, the Hoover Dam remains a must-see destination and a powerful reminder of what we can achieve when we dare to dream big.

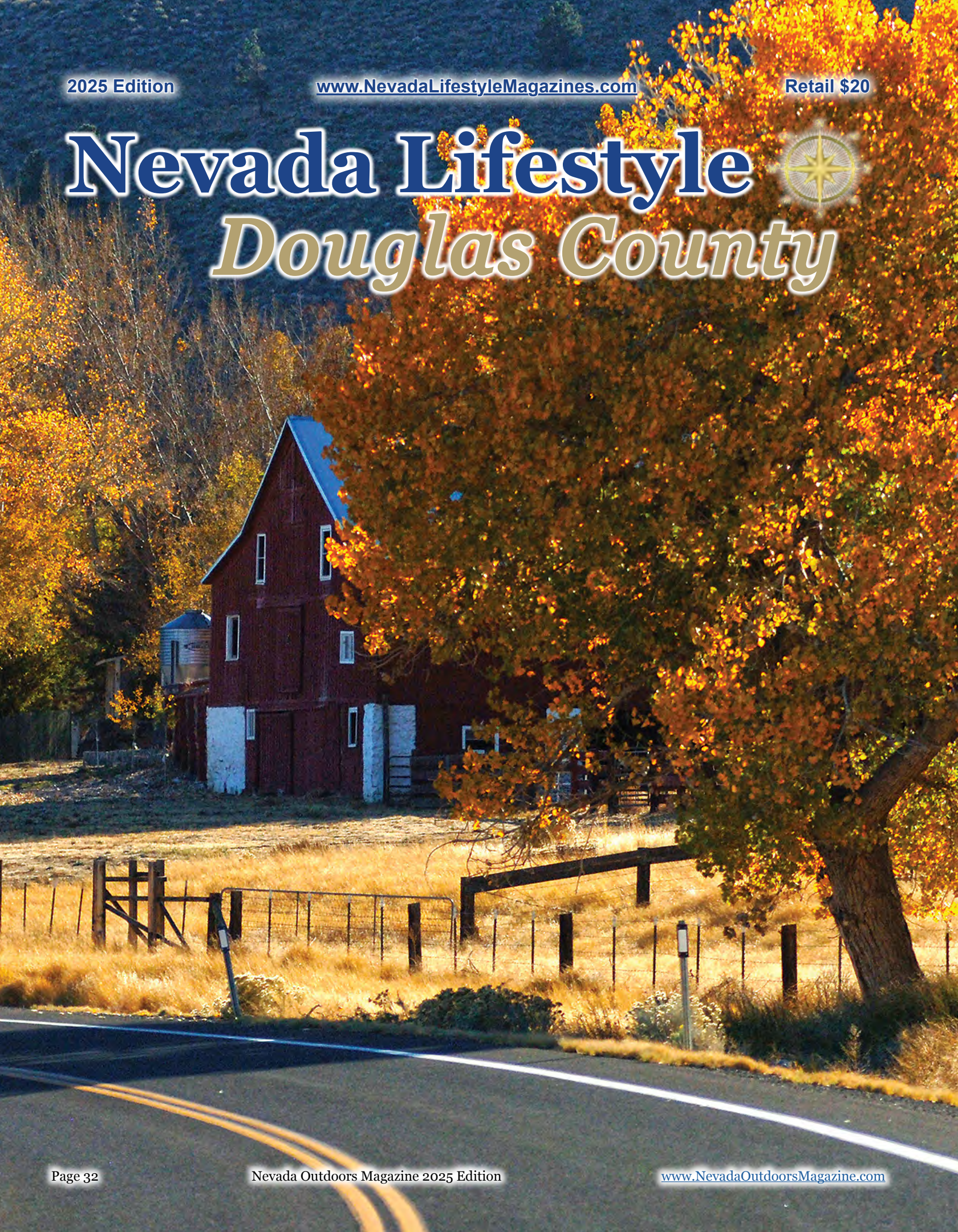

## WELCOME TO THE GENOA BAR AND SALOON, NEVADA'S OLDEST THIRST PARLOR!

Our guests always have many questions, and I hope to answer some of them for you...

First of all...the building was built in 1853 and I was first open for business as Livingston's Exchange, then renamed "Fettic's Exchange" in 1884 and operated by Frank Fettic. I was well known as a "gentleman's saloon" back then and I was "kept in first-class style in every particular way." Mr. Fettic served fine wines, liquors, and cigars. According to one of his advertisements, " would be pleased to have all my old friends call, and they would be treated in the most cordial manner."

I have changed hands many times over the years and in 1963, I was bought by the Bob and Betty Carver family who ran my great establishment until 2000, when they retired and sold the bar to Willy and Cindy Webb.

The top of my bar is original from the front to mid-way where you'll see a line across it. The medallions on the ceiling above the lights are original as is the one red oil lamp which is lit every New Year's Eve. The electric lamps are also original to the bar and were oil but converted to electricity at the turn of the century. I'm kept warm in winter by the woodstove, and since it's the only source of heat, the locals often bring in firewood when I'm getting low. And, no, those are not blood stains you see on the ceiling (it's tomato juice) while there have been many rough and tumbles here, no one was ever killed. And yes, we grow our own cobwebs here too.

The Diamond Dust Mirror on the back of the bar came from Glasgow, Scotland, in the late 1840's. It was shipped around the "horn" to San Francisco, then brought here by covered wagon. Originally, there were two mirrors, but one was sold to a movie company in the 1930's during the great depression. If you shine a flashlight in the mirror, you can see the diamond dust! The mirror has only been out of the saloon three times in it's history, the last time in 1910 when it was saved from the great Genoa Fire which destroyed most of the town.

If you look on the floor on the left side of the pool table, you'll see a trap door which leads down to the cold storage cellar. Ice was packed in burlap and straw and transported by mule down from two small lakes in the mountains behind me. There are many stories about the cellar -drunks are thrown down there to "sleep it off" -dancing girls come out at night -the local kids have all been taught that alligators and monsters live down there!

Many famous people have visited over the years. Among them, Mark Twain when he first reported for the Territorial Enterprise which opened in Genoa before moving to Virginia City. Presidents Ulysses S. Grant and Theodore “Teddy” Roosevelt enjoyed “cool ones”, perhaps right where you’re standing. Carol Lombard and Clark Gable came here to play high stakes poker games with the local cattle barons. Among the other famous and infamous, Lauren Bacall, Richard Boone, Ronnie Howard, Red Skelton, Cliff Robertson and all of our Nevada Governors have come through my doors.

Musicians seem to gravitate here. I’ve welcomed Willie Nelson, Charlie Daniels, Merle Haggard, Waylon Jennings, Johnny Cash, Slim Pickens, John Denver, and the Captain and Tennille to name just a few.

There have been a lot of “high old times” within these walls over the years and that tradition continues to this day. When the weather is warm, impromptu “porch parties” happen and there can be dancing in the streets. On cold winter evenings when the snow is falling, nothing beats the wood stove and good friends for a couple of hours.

I continue to be a “drinking establishment” notwithstanding the pool table and jukebox -I’m proud that our lady friends feel comfortable and safe here -I watch out for everyone in this little corner of history. I’m delighted that you stopped by to share your time with me!

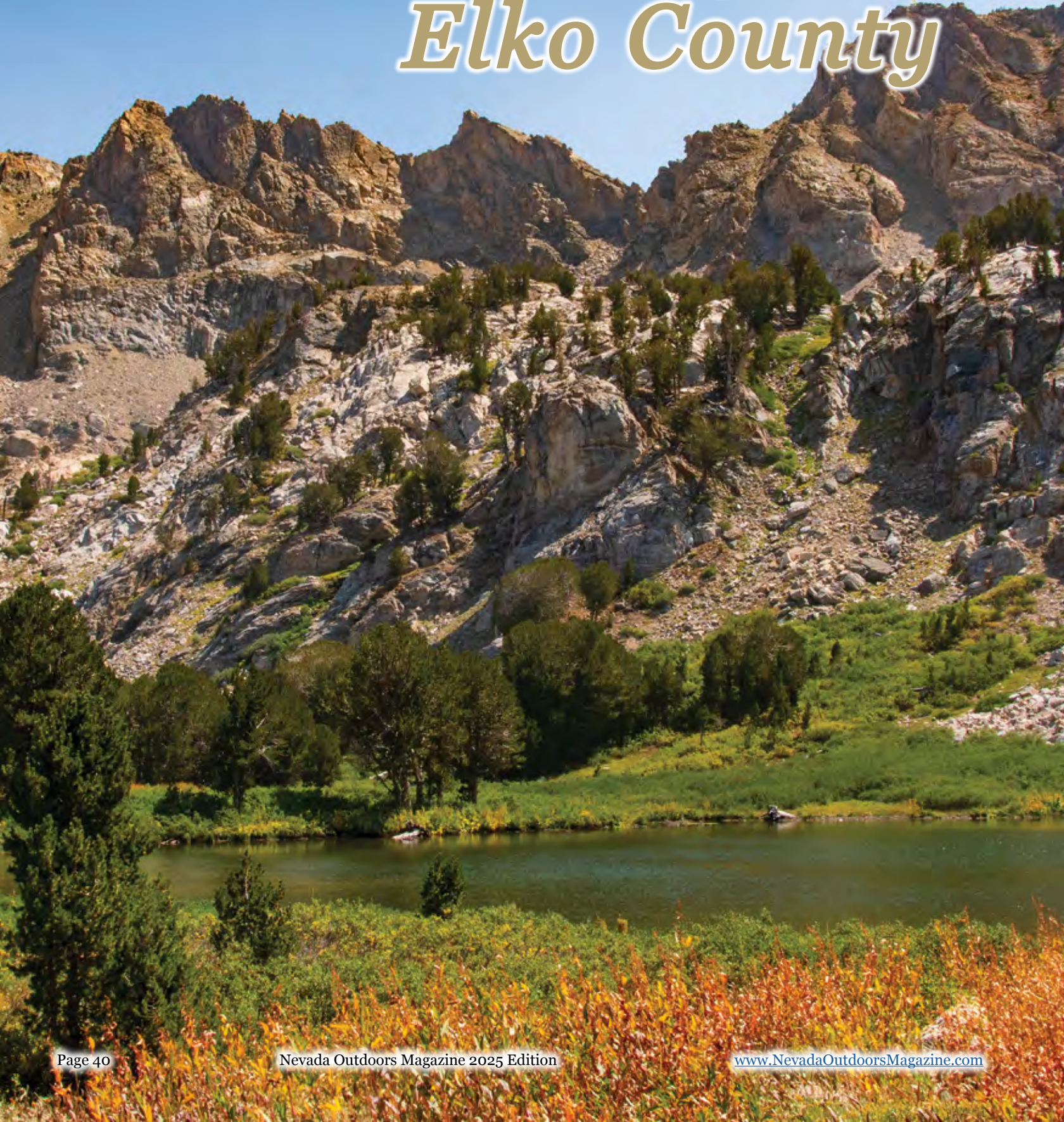

## **SHELDON NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE - DENIO, NEVADA**

The refuge is renowned for being home to the iconic desert bighorn sheep, as well as pronghorn antelope, various types of deer, chorus frogs, sagebrush lizards, kangaroo rats, and over 200 species of birds. It also serves as a crucial breeding

ground for peregrine falcons. Ensuring the preservation and flourishing of these wildlife habitats constitutes one of the primary responsibilities of the refuge.

Apart from its remarkable wildlife, Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge is revered for its diverse cultural events, including horseback riding, hunting, and professional photography. Additionally, it plays a crucial role in facilitating ecological and geological research pertaining to the desert ecosystem.

## **BUCKLAND STATION - SILVER SPRINGS, NEVADA**

Buckland Station, situated in Lyon County, Nevada, is a notable historical site. ## HAWTHORNE ORDNANCE MUSEUM - HAWTHORNE, NEVADA

With its establishment came Hawthorne's new identity as a military town, which eventually earned the moniker of "America's Patriotic Home." Currently, it stands as the largest ammunition depot worldwide.

In the present day, tourists are afforded the opportunity to delve deeper into Hawthorne's esteemed history through the remarkable and vast collection of historical artifacts housed at the Hawthorne Ordnance Museum.

Within its walls, visitors are greeted with a plethora of exhibits showcasing various types of ammunition dating back to the early years of the 20th century. Additionally, they have the chance to explore the region's rich munitions heritage.

## **WHEELER PEAK GLACIER - WHITE PINE COUNTY, NEVADA**

One of the remaining few glaciers in the western United States' Great Basin Region is Wheeler Peak Glacier, found in White Pine County, Nevada. 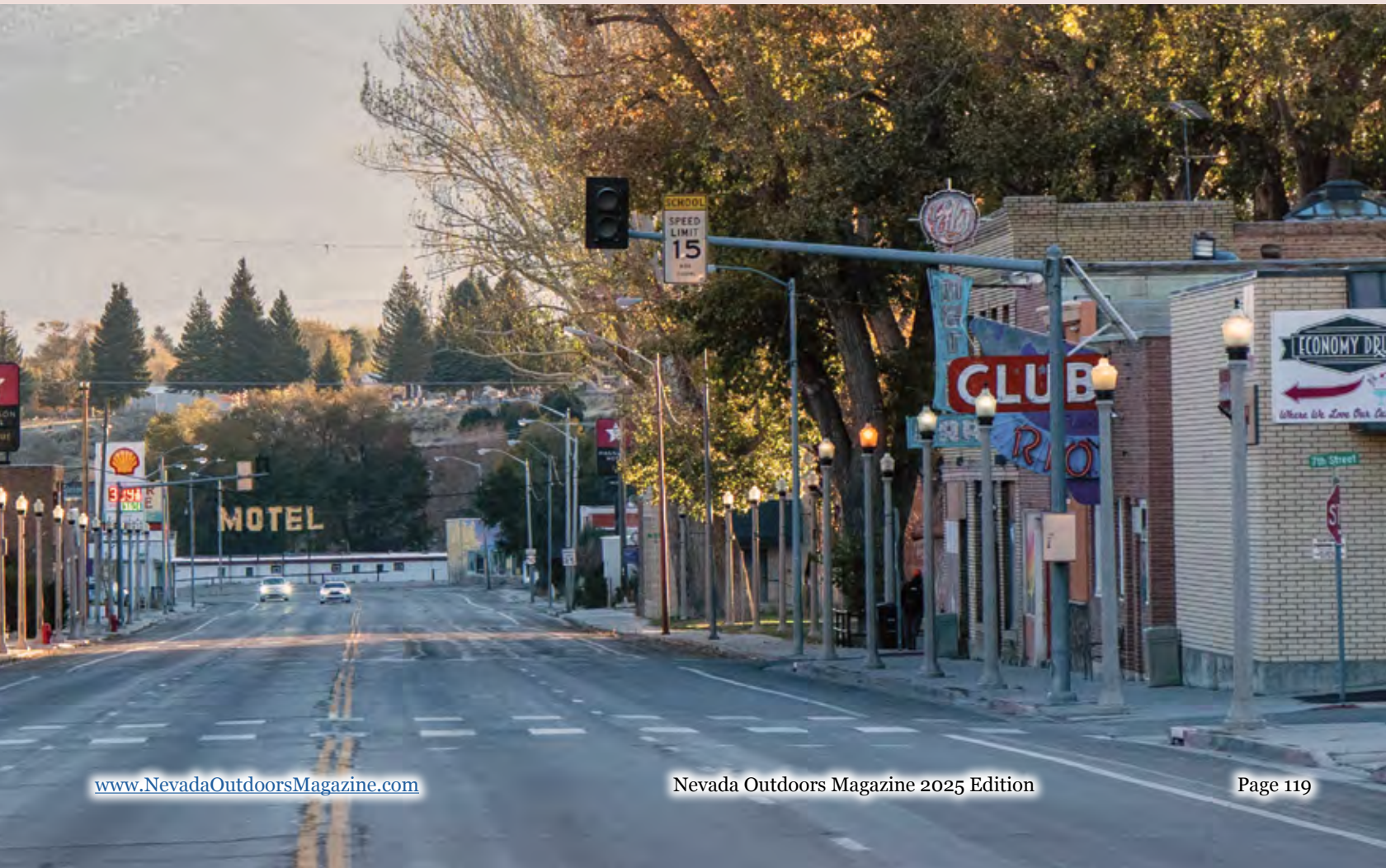
