



Standing Sentinel in the Sagebrush: The Enduring History of Stokes Castle in Austin, Nevada

In the heart of Nevada's desolate yet captivating landscape, just outside the tiny town of Austin, rises a peculiar structure that seems oddly out of place: Stokes Castle. This three-story, turreted monument, resembling a miniature medieval fortress, stands as a stark reminder of a bygone era, a testament to ambition, and a silent witness to the boom-and-bust cycles of the American West. Its history is as intriguing as its unusual architecture, weaving a tale of mining magnates, shattered dreams, and enduring architectural eccentricity.

The story of Stokes Castle begins with Anson Phelps Stokes, a prominent New York capitalist with interests spanning mining, railroads, and real estate. In 1896, Stokes invested in the Nevada Company, a silver mining venture in Austin. While the mine proved fruitful for a time, allowing him to amass considerable wealth, Stokes also had a keen eye for aesthetics and a desire to leave his mark on the landscape. Inspired by medieval towers he'd seen during his travels in Italy, he commissioned the construction of Stokes Castle in the summer of 1897.

The three stories were divided into separate apartments, each complete with fireplaces, balconies, and modern (for the time) amenities like running water and indoor plumbing. Detailed plans were drawn up, and skilled stonemasons were hired to meticulously craft the structure, resulting in a building that was undeniably grand and imposing.

However, the grandeur was short-lived. The Stokes family only occupied their unique Nevada retreat for a single summer. Various rumored explanations surround their departure. Some say the mine's production began to decline, diminishing its allure. Others suggest Mrs. Stokes was unimpressed with the remote location and harsh climate. Whatever the reason, the family quickly abandoned the castle, leaving its elaborate facade to face the relentless Nevada sun and wind.

In the years that followed, Stokes Castle fell into disrepair. The interior furnishings were looted, the windows were smashed, and the elements began to take their toll on the stone structure. Despite the neglect, the exterior walls remained stubbornly intact, a testament to the quality of the original construction.

The passing decades saw the castle change hands several times. Various owners attempted to restore or repurpose the property, but none were successful in bringing it back to its former glory. Eventually, Stokes Castle was acquired by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), which now manages the site.

Today, Stokes Castle stands as a shell of its former self, but its enduring presence continues to captivate visitors. The interior is inaccessible for safety reasons, but the exterior remains remarkably well-preserved, allowing visitors to marvel at the architectural oddity and imagine the life it once held. Gazing upon the sturdy stone walls, one can almost hear the echoes of bustling activity, the laughter of children, and the ambitious dreams of a mining magnate.

Stokes Castle is more than just a crumbling building; it's a tangible link to Nevada's vibrant past. HICKISON PETROGLYPHS - AUSTIN, NEVADA

Located in the U.S. state of Nevada, the Hickison Petroglyph Recreation Area offers public access to ancient petroglyphs made by prehistoric people who resided near Hickison Summit, situated at the northern tip of the Toquima Range and the southern end of the Simpson Park Mountains.

This recreational site, managed by the Bureau of Land Management, can be found 24 miles (39 km) east of Austin on U.S. Route 50. Positioned at an elevation of 6,500 feet (2,000 m) above sea level, the area lies on the western periphery of the Monitor Valley within the vast expanse of the Great Basin.

The park showcases a self-guided tour covering a 0.5-mile (0.8 km) trail adorned with numerous petroglyph panels, offering visitors the opportunity to admire the region's high-desert flora and enjoy breathtaking vistas of both the Toquima and Toiyabe mountain ranges, as well as the Big Smoky Valley.

Facilities at the site include 16 campsites, a day-use area, toilets, grills, picnic tables, and trash cans; however, there is no access to water. The name Hickison Summit was given in honor of John Hickerson, the owner of a nearby ranch, and the road leading to the Hickerson ranch traverses this summit.

In close proximity to Hickison Summit, one can find various prehistoric hunting and living sites that date back to 10,000 B.C., along with more recent remnants such as mining camps and ranches. Notably, the area also served as part of the trails once used by 19th-century explorers John C. Frémont and James H. Simpson, as well as the routes of the Pony Express and the Overland Stage.

During the earliest stages of the prehistoric era, the Great Basin was home to expansive lakes, including Lake Toiyabe and Lake Tonopah located in the Big Smoky Valley to the west of Hickison Summit. As the climate gradually became arid, these lakes receded, leading to the replacement of the former lake-dependent cultures by hunter-gatherer societies. Upon the arrival of the first European-Americans around 1850, the region was inhabited by the Western Shoshone people.





FUN FACTS ABOUT THE WHPSC:

Racers from more than 14 different nations are warmly received by the WHPSC, a competition viewed by millions of spectators worldwide. The 4,619 ft (1408 m) high track offers riders a stretch of over 4 miles

for acceleration, enabling motorcycles to achieve their highest speed prior to being clocked over a span of 200 meters.

To grasp these motorcycles, the one parked in your garage should be disregarded. Primarily, these vehicles are laid-back recumbents, featuring pedals and gears positioned far ahead. Riders are snugly lodged within fiberglass or other composite shells matching the width of their shoulders. In order to maintain optimal aerodynamic efficiency and low height, certain designs do away with windshields.

Control of the vehicle is executed through observing a TV screen similar in size to a recipe card. The handlebars are sufficiently broad to accommodate two hands, hosting compact mechanisms for managing gears and brakes. Riders are securely fastened inside the aerodynamic capsules using tape. Fairings envelop the rider and almost the entirety of the bike tires, typically with a slit for a breathing apparatus and a small opening for the camera lens.
