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

ELGIN SCHOOLHOUSE STATE HISTORIC SITE - ELGIN, NEVADA





The Ghosts of Charcoal Past: Exploring the History of the Panaca Kilns in Lincoln County, Nevada





BEAVER DAM STATE PARK -
